What does the new strategic plan mean to you?


The new plan will ensure that the City of Hobart continues to remain relevant within the community, build resilience and achieve ongoing sustainability, in particular:

NEW ONLINE PORTAL FOR EASY APPLICATIONS

THE home for online access to planning, building and plumbing application details with the City of Hobart has changed.

A new e-services portal has been introduced on the City's website which gives the option of searching both current and historical planning, building and plumbing application information.

Applications currently being considered by the City can be tracked to determine their status in the process. The planning button on the applications page also enables access to currently advertised applications including associated documentation.

The service will be expanded over the next few months to enable online lodgement of applications as well as retrieval of permits for a range of applications.

The new e-services portal on the City of Hobart website also provides a link to a payments page for the online payment of rates, dog registrations and parking infringements.

CITY OF HOBART BUDGET OVERVIEW 2014-15

IN a first for the City of Hobart, the Council 6.8 per cent, which will add a further 0.8 per • the redevelopment of a new sports pavilion will deliver an underlying budget surplus for the third consecutive year.

For the last three years, the City of Hobart has embedded a cost management ethic to minimise the cost to ratepayers. From listening to community concerns, the City acknowledges the financial burden people face through everyday cost of living pressures and will deliver its lowest rate increase in nine years, excluding the one off deviation when water and sewerage were removed from the City's control.

The City of Hobart's 2014–15 rate increase is in line with Hobart's consumer price index at 2.76 per cent. Importantly, the State Fire Levy, collected by the Council and controlled by the State Government will increase by

cent to the overall rate increase.

With assets worth more than \$1.07 billion, the City recognises that a responsible and active approach to asset renewal needs to be undertaken to ensure that future generations will not be expected to carry the financial burden of asset replacement.

2014–15 Capital Works Program

The Council has allocated \$25.2 million to new assets and asset renewal. This includes:

- the replacement of street lights with more energy efficient alternatives
- Inner City Action Plan projects, in particular significant work on Liverpool Street to coincide with the redevelopment of the Myer Hobart store

- at Soldiers Memorial Oval on the Queens Domain
- upgrade of the irrigation and drainage system for South Hobart Oval
- significant upgrade of storm water infrastructure in Collins and Macquarie
- upgrade of the Springs visitor facilities on kunanyi/Mount Wellington.

Importantly, the coming year will also see significant road and cycle infrastructure improvements with road resurfacing projects in Macquarie Street, Churchill Avenue and Sandy Bay Road, the construction of improved pedestrian and cycle facilities in Morrison Street and continued work on extending the Sandy Bay Cycleway.

The City of Hobart will require revenue from rates and charges to increase by \$2.7 million or five per cent to continue to meet the needs of the community. This five per cent increase is represented by:

- rate base growth 1.44 per cent
- 2.76 per cent increase to fund the increased cost of providing services
- 0.8 per cent increase to fund the increase in the State Government fire levy.

Council's underlying operating result is forecast to improve by \$2.2 million, to a surplus of \$2.48 million in 2014–15.

The 2014–15 budget is fiscally responsible and it balances prudent investment and expenditure with community need and aspiration. The City of Hobart is proud to deliver an extensive range of programs and services to the community.





TIP TOP TRACK RESTORED FOR THE PUBLIC

A DEDICATED group of volunteers has assisted the City of Hobart to reinstate the popular Tip Top mountain bike track in South Hobart.

The track was originally built in 2007 by a group of local mountain bikers, however unsustainable construction techniques led to the track's erosion and it was eventually closed in 2009.

The restoration project engaged with volunteers and mountain bike riders over four weekends to improve the track's sustainability and it also provided an opportunity for riders to design a track that was tailored to their

needs. The collaboration has resulted in a high grade construction with extra care taken to harmonise the track with the local environment.

The Tip Top track plays an important role connecting riders between kunanyi/Mount Wellington and South Hobart and it also connects with a number of other tracks within the area. The City of Hobart is grateful for the volunteers' efforts, collectively donating more than 200 hours of their time to complete this community project.

CITY MARKS MILESTONE IN WASTE AND RESOURCE RECOVERY

THE City of Hobart marked its commitment to providing high-quality waste disposal infrastructure with the official opening of the redeveloped McRobies Gully Waste Management Centre in June this year.

The City has been actively planning for Hobart's future waste needs by addressing key waste management issues, including waste minimisation, service provision, infrastructure and sustainability.

The new Waste Transfer Station and redeveloped Resource Recovery Centre are the final major projects to come on line, with the Resource Recovery Centre enabling Hobart residents to further reduce the volume of material going to landfill.

The Waste Transfer Station provides users with an undercover and fully paved facility

which is safe and easily accessible. This means that light vehicles no longer need to drive to the face of the landfill to deposit residual waste.

HOBART RECEIVES ENERGY EFFICIENT LIGHTING UPGRADE

HOBART'S city centre streetlights have been upgraded with new energy efficient LED lights as part of the Energy Efficient Street Lighting Accelerated Roll Out scheme, which has been funded by a grant of \$3.375 million from the Australian Government.

A portion of this grant has been used to upgrade the lighting in sections of Collins, Liverpool, Murray, Criterion and Elizabeth Streets and in Wapping. 150 new lights now provide a whiter, more uniform light and are expected to improve safety for both vehicles and pedestrians in the city centre.


The upgraded lighting technology has reduced energy consumption, despite increasing streetscape luminosity threefold. The new lighting is expected to require reduced maintenance which will lower operational costs for the City of Hobart in the future.

Elections for the City of Hobart Are you enrolled?

The elections for the City of Hobart will be held in October 2014. A list of all vacancies and a call for nominations for the positions of twelve Aldermen, Lord Mayor and Deputy Lord Mayor will be published in The Mercury newspaper on Saturday 13 September. Nominations will open from 15 September until noon on 29 September.

All eligible electors will receive a postal ballot pack in their letterboxes between 14 and 17 October.

If you are currently on the House of Assembly Electoral Roll at an address within the boundaries of the Hobart municipal area, you are automatically eligible to vote. If you are eligible to be on the Electoral Roll but are not correctly enrolled at present, you can obtain an enrolment form from any post office or the Tasmanian Electoral Commission www.tec.tas.gov.au or 1800 801 701.

ENROLMENT CLOSES AT 6PM ON THURSDAY 18 SEPTEMBER 2014

What if I don't live in Hobart but I own a property there? Can a corporate body vote?

If you are a resident in a municipal area outside of Hobart but you own or occupy land in Hobart, you are eligible to vote in the Local Government Elections for the City of Hobart. A corporate body which owns or occupies land in Hobart is also entitled to nominate one person to vote on its behalf.
